


The Birthplace of The Oil Industry Finds A Path Towards Saving Its Historic Architecture

History of Planning in Titusville

- 1865: Titusville Residents Establish "Community Committees" to control planning and development of town, seeking a delineation between residential areas and the commercial and industrial zones.
- 1870's: 0il Boom dissipates. Other petroleum-related service, transportation and manufacturing industries are established to ensure survival, indeed success, of the town.

Redevelopment Caused Significant Loss of Buildings in Latter Half of 20th Century

- The Citizens Bank Flatiron-style building demolished in 1966 to build a shopping complex.
- The Colonel Drake Hotel, which was sold and torn down in 1998 to make way for a CVS Pharmacy.
- The Odd Fellows Building in 2009, an anchor building on a corner torn down to make way for a parking lot.

Options for Enacting Legal Preservation Measures

Create a HARB (Historic Architectural Review Board).

Enact the Zoning Overlay District and pass Historic Preservation Zoning Ordinances.

Create a Demo-only Ordinance, which would be enforced by a Demo Review Board.

Where We Are Now

- 2013: Results from a survey taken by The Planning Commission (with 200 respondents) expressed that there is concern about the loss of historic structures and blight. There was both support and concern about providing a committee (HARB) with legal powers to enforce preservation measures.
- 2013-15: This survey, as well as several public discussions, have resulted in The Planning Commission recommending that City Council pursue the creation of professional design guidelines to inform our next step.

Where We Are Now

- Early 2016: Discussions for and against historic preservation played out at City Council meetings and in editorials published by the Titusville Herald newspaper.
- February 2016: Titusville City Council votes 4-1 in favor of pursuing a Keystone Historic Preservation Grant to obtain design guidelines.
